
It was a privilege to gain an insight into the challenges faced by some key individuals in our community, and, as Christians with a common purpose, to pray for them.

Early on Thursday 10th October Christians from churches across Harrogate gathered at The Ivy for the second annual Civic Prayer Breakfast – organised by The Harrogate Hub.

We invited three representatives from different aspects of town life to tell us how we could support them in prayer.

Paula Lorimer (*on the left in the picture*) spoke about the Harrogate Convention Centre and its role in the commercial life of the town.



These are the prayer points from the Civic Prayer Breakfast:

CONVENTION CENTRE

- The health and well-being of staff.
- For a strong, supportive local network between businesses, residents and the centre.
- For productive co-operation between the Council and Conference Centre.

POLICE

- A desire for a civil society.
- The well being of our emergency services staff and officers.
- The future prospects for our young people.

EDUCATION

- The growing issue of children's mental health linked to their use of social media and also to peer pressure.
- The pressure placed on school staff, particularly teachers, to meet ever rising standards and ever changing accountability measures.
- The concern amongst young people (linked to last week's climate strike) over damage done to the environment from irresponsible fuel and plastics use.

LOCAL COUNCIL

- Housing and homelessness enabling affordable housing and avoiding homelessness.
- Major events in Harrogate (e.g. UCI World Cycling Championships).
- Traffic and Transport for a strong partnership with NYCC to help reduce congestion and carbon emissions.

Religious identity then and now 1569 – 2019 Marking the 450th Anniversary of the Rising of the North



The Rising of the North in 1569 attempted to stop the rise of the Protestant religion by deposing Elizabeth I and replacing her with the Catholic Mary, Queen of Scots. Sir Thomas de Markenfield was one of the main instigators of the plot and on 20th November 1569, a contingent of rebels met at Markenfield Hall. *The Ripon Support Group of the Anglican Centre Rome* has arranged a day to mark this anniversary on Saturday 26th October. The morning will be spent at Markenfield

Hall with a guided tour and a talk about the history of the Rising of the North. In the afternoon there will be a talk *'Religious Identity Today*' at Thorp Prebend with a visit to Ripon Cathedral and a walk to the Market Place.
