## Looking ahead to Lent, looking forward to Easter



#### **Dignity Through Education**

**Dignity Through Education** is an association set up by a group of people in Bilton. It aims to give financial assistance to the children of some of the poorest people in Sri Lanka. These people are tea plantation workers. They live and work in some of the harshest conditions imaginable. Their standard of living is the lowest of any community in Sri Lanka and well below the minimum that we ourselves would find acceptable.



Tea pickers, mostly women, start work at the crack of dawn, sometimes in heavy rain and bitterly cold weather, and work until till late afternoon. All that they earn is the equivalent of £3 -£5 per day. They have been fighting for a few years now for a minimum daily wage of Rupees 1000, about £4.50 at today's exchange rate. These labourers contribute nearly 70% of the foreign exchange earnings of Sri Lanka but have been denied the basics in terms of standard education, housing, medical and

sanitary amenities for nearly 150 years. For example, many workers still live in the line-rooms built by the British planters who brought workers from the Tamil Nadu area of India in the 1860s and which have hardly changed since that time.

Poverty is the way of life for these people, but education offers a route out of poverty. Education for the children of tea estate workers is limited, but occasionally dedicated students are able to achieve the grade requirements for entry to university. Although education in Sri Lanka is free, there are still things that students must pay for and the cost is often beyond the means of self-sacrificing parents. For this reason our association, **Dignity through Education**, aims to offer small bursaries to the children of poor tea plantation workers who have achieved a place at university. The bursary amounts to £144 per student per year of study. New sponsors are always welcome. They can make a single annual payment or pay monthly by direct debit.
