The Mission to Seafarers caring for seafarers during COVID-19

This Anglican charity now has a presence in 200 ports in 50 different countries worldwide, providing support to seafarers regardless of their rank, nationality, gender or religion. Over 90% of world trade is carried by sea, providing work to 1.5 million seafarers. However, it is one of the world's most dangerous occupations, with piracy, shipwreck and abandonment just some of the threats seafarers face. Mental health issues affect many seafarers, but the Mission to Seafarers' volunteers and chaplains are there to provide emotional and spiritual support, whether that's on board ship or at their Seafarers Centres ashore.

The Mission launched the *Flying Angel Campaign* in response to the impact COVID-19 has had on all seafarers, here are some of the areas it covers:



Digital Chaplaincy - With shore leave denied and access to ships becoming more difficult for the Chaplains, seafarers' worries and anxieties have become heightened during this crisis. The Mission now 25 trained and qualified has chaplains from across all time zones offering a live 'chat line' seafarers with many under extended contracts and reduced access to chaplains in ports, this service has become crucial.

Connectivity for seafarers – however, there are still large numbers of seafarers without access to the internet on board their ships. Most of them are now denied shore leave because of COVID-19 restrictions and so find themselves cut off from the outside world. The Mission are providing mobile Mifi units while a ship is in port, so that seafarers can at last communicate with their families – even delivering the units by a bucket lowered over the side of the ship, when Chaplains were not allowed onboard!

Safe Seafarer Centres – as restrictions are lifted, the Mission's 121 port centres are being made ready to reopen with deep cleaning as well as Perspex screens, hand sanitising units and signage being fitted. To safely transport coronavirus -free seafarers to these centres the Mission's global fleet of over 30 minibuses are also being adapted. **Advocacy** – the Mission always responds to a myriad of seafarers' issues including justice and welfare cases, repatriation, abandonment, late payment of wages, shortages of food and money, piracy, bullying and discrimination. During the pandemic these cases have become even more prevalent, with the most recent being supporting the more than 100 seafarers stranded in the UK unable to get

home to India when the borders closed.

Creationtide and Climate Sunday

Creationtide is the season in the annual church calendar, from 1st September to 4th October, dedicated to God as Creator and Sustainer of all life. The theme for 2021 is *A Home for All*,



renewing the oikos of God. Oikos means 'home' or 'family' and is the root of words starting with 'eco' like 'ecology' and 'economics'. In the months leading up to the UN climate change talks in November 2021 (COP26), churches are being encouraged to hold a special Climate Sunday service, to make a commitment to tackle climate change, and to call on world leaders to do the same.

On Climate Sunday, 5th September, St Peter's are holding a climate-focused service to reflect on how we can each play our part in reducing greenhouse gas emissions, to pray, and to commit to action. Climate Sunday has an on-line declaration that you may decide to sign up to at <u>https://thetimeisnow.uk/</u> before or after the service. Stewart Davies, St Peter's Environmental Officer, will be our preacher at our 9:30 am Family Communion Service. On 3rd October, as Creationtide comes to an end, we are planning to hold our Harvest Festival and Animal Service.
